How will you introduce the objective to students? How will you model or demonstrate for students? The teacher will demonstrate how to make hot chocolate for students, and then model how to write directions for what the teacher did. Depending on time and student level, the teacher may choose to: (A) write all the steps on chart paper, PowerPoint, storyboard template or an interactive white board first before demonstrating the activity, (B) write the steps while demonstrating the activity, or (C) follow the verbal directions of the students while demonstrating the activity.
